
Vulnerabilities in technology vital to interconnected, critical infrastructure operations represent a threat to both national and economic security. Managing these vulnerabilities has become a critical component of customer care and protecting citizens. There are no standards or broad agreements among stakeholders regarding how, when, and to whom to disclose vulnerabilities. Unfortunately, these inconsistencies can lead to ineffective vulnerability management and put critical infrastructure at unnecessary risk.

After studying the complex issue of vulnerability disclosure, the NIAC has drawn six conclusions, which are described in the attached summary. The report also includes comprehensive guidelines for all stakeholders in the vulnerability disclosure process. Following these guidelines will bring consistency and efficiency to a process that has been fraught with misunderstanding and disagreement. Finally, the report makes seven recommendations to the President to direct appropriate departments and agencies involved in any aspect of managing software vulnerabilities.

Mr. President, on behalf of our fellow NIAC members, thank you for the opportunity to serve our Country through participation in this Council.
